

Multiple Choice Questions

Eliminate answers you know are wrong.

Read all the choices. Do not just mark the first answer that looks good.

“All of the above” answers are often correct.

If you are not sure about a number answer, take out the high and low numbers and consider the middle range numbers.

Try to anticipate the answer before you read the choices.

Longer choices tend to be the correct answers.

Generally B or C is a better guess than A or D

Read each choice with the question. One of the choices may sound right when you read it.

Be aware of words like “always”, “never”, “only”, “must”, and “completely.” These are usually the wrong answers since there are many exceptions to rules.
